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I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Illegal drugs now affect virtually every component of our society. The High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) Program is designed to significantly disrupt the market for these illicit activities. Every time illegal drugs and associated drug assets are seized, the regional marketplace for illegal drugs suffers a setback. These seizures hit drug trafficking organizations (DTOs) hard, affecting their profitability, and frequently their ultimate survival. By disturbing the drug supply chain, particularly at the multi-state or international level; law enforcement impacts the drug flow before it ever reaches the individual user but law enforcement activities have a cost. A key question emerges when studying the effectiveness of the HIDTA program. How efficiently and effectively are public dollars being spent on the HIDTA objectives? This report has been prepared to answer those questions. During this reporting period, the Northern California HIDTA initiatives disrupted the market for illegal drugs by meeting or exceeding most of their performance targets for the year, and they did so in a safe and cost effective manner. The following highlights illustrate this success.

- ▶ The Northern California HIDTA (NC HIDTA) serves a community of seven million residents, throughout the greater San Francisco Bay/Silicon Valley Area. The HIDTA's ten designated counties cover more than 10,000 square miles from Lake County in the north to Monterey County in the south. The primary area of operation for most HIDTA services is within the urban San Francisco, Oakland and San Jose regions. More than one-hundred federal, state and local law enforcement agencies provide service throughout the Northern California HIDTA.
- ▶ Considering the size and diversity of the region and the large number of law enforcement agencies that serve the area, intelligence sharing, deconfliction, technical assistance and coordination services are critical to the effective and safe delivery of drug enforcement services provided by the NC HIDTA. To maximize the results of Northern California's drug enforcement efforts, the NC HIDTA facilitates cooperation and joint efforts between disparate law enforcement organizations. There are more than 40 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies with more than 190 sworn and non-sworn personnel participating in the NC HIDTA regional law enforcement initiatives and task forces. With support from the NC HIDTA Investigative Support Center (ISC), regional initiatives continue to make significant progress in identifying, investigating and dismantling or disrupting the area's most dangerous and prolific DTOs, drug dealers, money launderers, gang members, and violent criminals.
- ▶ Like every HIDTA in the country, the Northern California HIDTA is governed by a balanced, (federal and state/local) Executive Board that administers policy and the annual budget based upon the national program guidance and the regional needs as identified in the NC HIDTAs annual threat assessment. The threat assessment when used with the HIDTAs Performance Measure (PMP) process provides an effective means of ensuring that funds are being allocated to address the threat at the Drug Trafficking Organization (DTO) level to include targeting Consolidated Priority Targets (CPOT) and Regional Priority Targets (RPOT). (As identified by the United States Department of Justice and the United States Attorney's Office for the Northern District.)

- ▶ The Northern California HIDTA, using the national HIDTA model of collocation, intelligence-led initiatives, information sharing and deconfliction, has effectively brought disparate law enforcement agencies together in a non-competitive, neutral environment. Even though state and local government budgets have been dramatically reduced over the past five years the NC HIDTA has improved law enforcement efficiency by fostering information sharing and the collocation of multi-jurisdictional investigative and enforcement initiatives.
- ▶ Because of significant state and local budget reductions, the NC HIDTA's support to law enforcement agencies in the region is more important than at any time since 1997 when the Northern California HIDTA was designed. In addition to the funding provided directly to HIDTA sponsored initiatives, the NC HIDTA provides critical support to any requesting law enforcement agency in the HIDTA area. The HIDTA's regional support programs include: its investigative support center (ISC) which provides tactical and strategic intelligence support, the investigative equipment lending program, the HIDTA funded wire intercept facility, tactical and case deconfliction services, and the law enforcement training initiative.
- ▶ Although fighting the battle against illicit drug trafficking is not without cost, the NC HIDTA leverages its federal budget by using resources assigned by federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies so that for every NC HIDTA budget dollar spent on law enforcement, prosecution and investigative support activities, contributed to removing \$134.00 in illicit drugs from the market and seizing \$4.00 of drug-related assets. The NC HIDTA initiatives achieved a remarkable combined Return-on-Investment (ROI) of \$138.00 for every \$1.00 of NC HIDTA funds that were invested.
- ▶ HIDTAs exist to disrupt and dismantle DTOs. At the beginning of 2005 the NC HDITA initiatives identified twenty-eight (28) DTOs and targeted twenty-eight (28). An additional twenty-seven (27) DTOs were newly identified and targeted. By the end of 2005, twenty (20) of these targeted DTOs were disrupted, and fifteen (15) DTOs were totally dismantled. This is a significant achievement. Several of the identified DTOs that have not yet been disrupted are still being investigated by NC HIDTA initiatives.
- ▶ The NC HIDTA strives to investigate larger, more complex DTOs where the greatest positive impact can be achieved. Disrupting or dismantling a large complex DTO generally takes longer than stopping a street level operation, but doing so can substantially reduce the illicit drug marketplace. As illustrated by the statistical measures contained throughout this Annual Report, during CY 2005, the NC HIDTA initiatives targeted more complex cases involving larger DTOs.
- ▶ The NC HIDTA continues to play a leading role in assisting the law enforcement, prosecution and investigative support initiatives with information sharing and training assistance. Information sharing and training support form the "glue" that binds these initiatives together by promoting and facilitating greater efficiency and effectiveness.

II. INTRODUCTION

The NC HIDTA is pleased to present this Annual Report documenting its activities during calendar year 2005. To fully appreciate the NC HIDTA's achievements, it is important to understand how each HIDTA is structured, and why it exists. The Director, Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), designates regions that have critical drug trafficking problems adversely impacting the United States as High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTAs). By design, HIDTA offices are located in these areas. The National HIDTA program is composed of 28 individual HIDTAs spread throughout the nation and is uniquely situated to counteract this illicit activity. HIDTAs play a significant role in addressing identified drug and drug-related problems, and offer real world solutions. The NC HIDTA has fostered cooperative and effective working relationships with more than 40 federal, state and local agencies that participate as members of HIDTA sponsored initiatives as well as many other agencies from throughout the region (who receive assistance from the NC HIDTA) in its effort to disrupt or dismantle DTOs. A brief description of each HIDTA initiative is included in the appendix of this report. A more detailed description of each initiative can be found in the NC HIDTA 2005 Strategy, which is available from the NC HIDTA office.

NC HIDTA law enforcement initiatives have established priorities that focus on the disruption or dismantlement of DTOs, especially those involved with drug-related violent crime, as well as targeting those DTOs that have the greatest adverse impact on the quality of life in neighborhoods and communities. There is a determined effort to counter drug movement into and through the region, and to arrest those who conceal the proceeds from illegal drug sales within the region. This is exemplified by the continuing enhancements to regional interdiction initiatives. These priorities are supported by a strong commitment from federal and state prosecutors to provide timely and sound legal advice and prosecution when deemed appropriate. The NC HIDTA Director and Executive Board members worked closely with law enforcement and local HIDTA staff to develop a vision for the future, which clearly reflects what outcomes HIDTA initiatives seek to achieve.

To achieve meaningful results, each HIDTA needs clear goals (the HIDTA Program Goals); a recognition of the challenges faced (the NC HIDTA Threat Assessment); a plan to get there (the NC HIDTA Strategy with quantifiable performance targets); and a way to document achievements (the NC HIDTA Annual Report). The overall HIDTA mission is embodied in the National Program Mission Statement:

Program Mission Statement**

The mission of the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) Program is to disrupt the market for illegal drugs in the United States by assisting federal, state, and local law enforcement entities participating in the HIDTA program to dismantle and disrupt drug trafficking organizations, with particular emphasis on drug trafficking regions that have harmful effects on other parts of the United States.

The NC HIDTA recognizes that without a clear mission and vision, the law enforcement, intelligence and prosecution communities cannot work in concert toward any mutual objectives,

and success cannot be quantified or measured. The NC HIDTA fully embraces the following mission and vision in conjunction with the national program objectives.

Vision Statement**

The vision of the Northern California HIDTA is to enhance the capabilities of state, federal and local law enforcement agencies by encouraging the synergy of resources, while enhancing the areas of efficiency and officer safety through the use of operational and investigative deconfliction. The NC HIDTA will continually strive to provide law enforcement agencies with pre-eminent grant funding, analytical services, technical equipment and training opportunities while earning a reputation for both the high quality of our work and the excellence of our people.



Mission Statement**

The Northern California HIDTA's Mission is to measurably reduce the availability of illicit drugs and drug-related crime and violence in support of the National Drug Control Strategy by encouraging: balanced governance of the HIDTA, inter-agency cooperation, the sharing of information, and use of strategic and tactical intelligence in the planning, budgeting and investigative process.

Reporting Period: This Annual Report covers the reporting period January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2005.

Budget Allocation: The NC HIDTA is funded by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) at \$2.69 million annually, a relatively small budget considering the geographic size and population of the area served and the drug threat that exists in the region. The NC HIDTA's area is a diverse, primarily urban area that serves as the gateway to the Pacific Rim and which is in relatively close proximity to the border with Mexico. Based on the NC HIDTA's threat assessment, the region faces significant drug threats on many levels. The San Francisco Bay Area is a base of operation for wholesale distributors of illegal drugs that are imported from international sources as well as those produced locally. These include Mexican national and Asian drug trafficking organizations (DTOs) that are involved in the manufacture and or distribution of large quantities of methamphetamine, heroin, MDMA, cocaine and marijuana. Local distributors with street gang affiliations fund their activities through the sale of drugs in the regions urban and suburban communities often times adding to the violent crime statistics as they battle over turf.

Geographic Area Covered: Lake, Sonoma, Marin, San Francisco, Alameda, Contra Costa, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz and Monterey Counties.



III. National HIDTA Goals

Every HIDTA has adopted two specific goals to achieve in facing the drug challenge. These two national goals guide all HIDTA initiatives and activities throughout the United States. The NC HIDTA is proud to present these national HIDTA program goals, plus concise summaries of its Threat Assessment for Budget Year 2005 and resultant Strategy in the following sections. The NC HIDTA has developed a strategy to meet local drug threats according to the needs of the region while continuing to comply with the National HIDTA Program guidance and objectives:

NATIONAL HIDTA GOALS

Goal 1: Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting drug trafficking and/or money laundering organizations; and

Goal 2: Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives.

Specifically, the mission of the NC HIDTA is to support Goal 2, Objective 2 of the National Drug Control Strategy, which is to “improve the ability of the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTAs) to counter drug trafficking.” Toward this end, NC HIDTA strives to measurably reduce the availability of illicit drugs and the occurrence of drug-related crime and violence in its 10-county region.

The HIDTA Goals represent clear targets for NC HIDTA initiatives. They also provide the foundation upon which performance, planning and outcome measurements are based. As the NC HIDTA develops budget submissions, each initiative must present programmatic and fiscal justifications that are based on the Threat Assessment; must articulate how the initiative’s funding request directly addresses the threat; set realistic performance measures; and must eventually provide specific information on how the funding has allowed the NC HIDTA to meet its desired outcomes. NC HIDTA initiatives are developed by staff and approved by the Executive Board in compliance with the national program guidelines that govern all HIDTA activities and expenditures.

The NC HIDTA Executive Board is significantly involved in all aspects of the Intelligence, Investigation and Interdiction activities. The Board provides a forum to share important trends in drug trafficking, gathers information on which drugs are being distributed throughout the region, and identifies DTOs. The Board also addresses important administrative issues in its oversight capacity. The Board has established an Intelligence Subcommittee that supports NC HIDTA initiatives and its participating agencies on a wide variety of intelligence issues, training, computer technology and other matters. NC HIDTA success is measured by results, and each initiative is fully accountable for its success or failure in meeting its objectives.

The NC HIDTA Program’s success is measured in part by its ability to facilitate greater efficiency, effectiveness and cooperation among and between external participating agencies at

the local, state and federal level, yielding tangible, measurable results. Collocation of federal, state and local law enforcement agencies to facilitate and enhance resource sharing is a key strategy. The extent of information sharing and inter-agency cooperation fostered by the NC HIDTA approach proves that separate law initiatives *are working together and sharing information, effectively and efficiently.*

IV. Summary of Threat Assessment for Budget Year 2005

Recognizing the importance of maximizing operational effectiveness, and to ensure that our citizens get the greatest return for tax dollars expended by the program, the NC HIDTA establishes annually, a sound strategic plan and realistic resource requests which emanate from a well-researched and thorough Threat Assessment. The NC HIDTA ISC prepares the annual threat assessment after conducting: threat and drug trafficking organization surveys, focus groups, discussions with treatment providers, a review of law enforcement statistics and other data sets that might assist in the process. For complete details of that assessment, the reader is referred to *The NC HIDTA Threat Assessment for Budget Year 2005*. The following summary is presented for your convenience.

The San Francisco Bay Area is a vital urban region with a cultural and economic impact on the entire nation. The San Francisco Bay Area include the counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and Sonoma. The population of the Bay Area totaled 6.9 million in 2000. The largest cities in the Bay Area in terms of population are San Jose, San Francisco, and Oakland. According to U.S. Census data, 58 percent of Bay Area residents were Caucasian, 18 percent were Asian, and 6 percent were Black or African American in 2000. In addition, 21 percent of Bay Area residents were of Hispanic or Latino descent, a higher proportion than the national rate of 12 percent.

The San Francisco Bay Area is a national-level distribution center for illicit drugs transported into the United States from Mexico—cocaine, heroin, marijuana, and methamphetamine as well as domestically produced marijuana and methamphetamine. Traffickers in the Bay Area supply illicit drugs to major drug markets in all regions of the country including Anchorage, Boston, Honolulu, Kansas City, Minneapolis, New York, and St. Louis.

The drug threat reported for 2005 indicated the following:

Methamphetamine production, distribution and consumption continued to be the primary drug threat facing NC HIDTA. Although the user population is diverse, Mexican National Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTOs) are responsible for the majority of manufacturing and distributing methamphetamine, as well as black tar heroin and cocaine, throughout the region.

Methamphetamine production has decreased in the Bay Area largely as a result of effective precursor controls. However, methamphetamine remains readily available as Mexican drug trafficking organizations (DTOs) and criminal groups increasingly transport it into the area from Mexico and the Central Valley.

Crystal methamphetamine, often referred to as “ice”, is readily available and a popular drug of choice. Most “ice” is converted by the Mexican National manufacturing organizations that were also responsible for originally manufacturing the methamphetamine used in the conversion.

In 2005, California law enforcement set record numbers in the seizures of marijuana plants. More than one million marijuana plants were confiscated. The large-scale cultivation of high grade marijuana is frequently controlled by Mexican national poly-drug DTOs. The command and control for many of these DTOs is headquartered and some of the grow operations occur within the NC HIDTA region. Many large marijuana cultivations are on U.S. Forest Service, BLM, state park or other public lands. Treatment providers are reporting an increase in teens and young adults seeking treatment for marijuana use or for other drug use problems that began with the use of high potency marijuana. There is an increasing number of indoor, hydroponic cultivations being reported in the region.

Street gangs dominate retail distribution of illicit drugs in most metropolitan areas in the Bay Area. Much of the violent and property crime in these areas is related to street gang activity including drug trafficking.

Drug traffickers launder illicit proceeds in the Bay Area primarily through the use of money transmittal businesses and by transportation of bulk quantities of currency to Mexico and to a much lesser extent, Canada. Traffickers also launder illicit drug proceeds by using informal value transfer systems; commingling proceeds with revenue of a legitimate business, and purchasing high-value assets.

V. HIDTA Strategy Summary

The reader is referred to [The NC HIDTA 2005 Strategy](#) for details on the NC HIDTA initiatives. The following summary is presented for your convenience.

The NC HIDTA approach is to combine the existing fourteen (14) 2005 investigative initiatives into six (6) investigative initiatives and to co-locate law enforcement personnel in multi-jurisdictional initiatives (task forces) to foster enhanced information and resource sharing. Through the combining and collocation of initiatives, the NC HIDTA fosters a comprehensive response to combating illicit drug activity by bringing together all available law enforcement resources in a cohesive strategy to address the problem. NC HIDTA law enforcement initiatives focus on DTOs, money laundering groups, violent drug offenders, open-air drug markets, firearms trafficking and domestic drug movement. Newly emerging narco-terrorism trends are also carefully monitored and information is shared with the Northern California Regional Terrorism Threat Assessment Center (NC RTTAC), the FBI’s Joint Terrorism Task Force (JTTF), the California State Terrorism Threat Assessment Center (STTAC), California DOJ’s California Anti-Terrorism Information Center (CATIC), and local law enforcement agencies.

NC HIDTA law enforcement initiatives are directed through their respective lead agencies’ management policies and are focused on the prevalent drug threats as identified in the NC HIDTA Threat Assessment. NC HIDTA law enforcement initiatives actively pursue the outcomes sought by the strictures of HIDTA Goal 1. All NC HIDTA initiatives enter case data

into the Western States Information Network database (one of the six RISS projects) through the Los Angeles Clearinghouse (LACLEAR), which facilitates information sharing, deconfliction, enhanced officer safety, and an ability to avoid unnecessary duplication of effort during investigations where there may be common elements or subjects. In 2005, law enforcement agencies within the region used NC HIDTA resources to deconflict 4,492 critical events and 24,120 case/subject deconflictions. Additionally, the NC HIDTA ISC provided intelligence support services for twenty-two (22) new drug investigations.

Enhanced communication, collaboration, and information sharing are key law enforcement components designed to promote maximum efficiency and effectiveness as prescribed by HIDTA Goal 2. Logically, Goal 1 and Goal 2 are closely intertwined, with Goal 2 providing the integration support services that enhance the ability for all initiatives to meet their goals.

VI. HIDTA Performance Measures

In an effort to demonstrate performance and effectiveness, HIDTAs across the country have instituted new procedures aimed at ensuring that HIDTA sponsored initiatives are achieving the results desired by the National HIDTA Program and their executive boards. The use of a standardized Performance Measures Program (PMP) introduces a new capability to quantify and track HIDTA targets and monitor results. With the application of new PMP procedures, the NC HIDTA Annual Report now functions as the report card; a barometer of HIDTA efficiency and effectiveness; a source for comparison with previous year efforts; and most importantly, provides direction for future action. The series of tables and charts now contained in the annual report present specific outputs and efficiency measures organized in NC HIDTA Goal order. These measurable results reflect a continuing increase in efficiency and effectiveness at lower programmatic costs.

Table 4- Note: The NC HIDTA initiatives worked a total of twenty-three (23) OCDETF cases in 2005. The above data reflects the number of CPOT, RPOT and OCDETF cases which were newly affiliated with HIDTA during 2005. It does not include the larger number of CPOT, RPOT and OCDETF cases which were carried over from previous years. Significant drug trafficking organizations are commonly investigated over several years. The preparation for OCDETF approval typically occurs several months after the identification of the DTO and the subsequent case initiation. Thus, CPOT, RPOT and OCDETF status frequently is obtained in the year following the identification of the DTO. The NC HIDTA worked a total of 23 OCDETF investigations during 2005, targeted five CPOT-related organizations, and six organizations with RPOT status.

Illicit drug trafficking, left unchecked, cuts deeply into the social fabric of our society, particularly in urban areas. This problem extends into rural America because of the substantial profits associated with drug cultivation, manufacturing, and sales. HIDTAs across the country target the organizations that participate in this illegal trade, and are dedicated to stopping them. Tables 1 through 4 reflect the remarkable impact NC HIDTA initiatives had on DTOs; not only within the HIDTA region itself, but also nationally and internationally. At the beginning of each year, NC HIDTA initiatives are hard at work investigating DTOs that have been previously identified, many of which will also have been specifically targeted for disruption or total dismantlement. Table 1 shows that as of January 2005, NC HIDTA initiatives had already identified 28 DTOs and targeted all 28 for either disruption or dismantlement. An additional 27 DTOs were identified and targeted during 2005. By the end of calendar year 2005, the NC HIDTA disrupted 20 and dismantled 15 of these DTOs.

Illicit drug trafficking occurs on several different levels ranging from local street dealers to the multi-state organizations, and ultimately to sophisticated international drug cartels. Traditionally, law enforcement has had its greatest successes at the street dealer level. These “small-time” operators were less sophisticated than the larger, better-financed DTOs and, consequently, presented easier targets. Unfortunately, disrupting or dismantling the “low hanging fruit” had little lasting effect on stopping illegal drugs. More emphasis needed to be placed on larger DTOs where a disruption or dismantlement would have greater impact on the marketplace. HIDTAs are geared to attack the problem at the upper levels. Table 2 explains NC HIDTA success in terms of the operational scope of the DTOs identified and targeted in calendar year 2005.

Table 5 - Note: The NC HIDTA seized 101.9 kg of khat, which is not listed in Core Table 5. Seizures in Table 5 are valued according to the price of the drug; Khat is sometimes seized, but rarely sold or purchased undercover. Therefore, pricing information was unavailable for our region.

The NC HIDTA seized methamphetamine in solution which was converted from gallons to its pound value of powder, at a rate of four pounds per gallon. A total of 31 gallons were seized, which would be 124 pounds, or 55.8 kilograms of finished product.

NC HIDTA seized many drugs which fall into the seizure category “Other” in the PMP. These drugs appear in Table 5 without units of measure. The units used were the following:

Seizing drugs from a DTO is analogous to eliminating inventories from a corporate sales department, leaving it with nothing to market. During CY 2005, the NC HIDTA had a significant impact on the region’s drug trade through its drug seizures. Table 5 lists the wholesale values of the respective drugs seized, thus giving a highly accurate and true depiction of the economic impact of removing these drugs from the marketplace. In this fashion, achieving the NC HIDTA goals is more clearly shown in terms of real dollar outcomes.

NC HIDTA initiatives seized \$9,721,604 in drug assets during CY 2005, thereby reducing availability and subsequent abuse. This is a dramatic increase in seizures over the baseline for CY 2004 and yields an ROI of \$4.00 for every \$1.00 of HIDTA funding invested.

A modern business is hurt by reductions to its bottom line profits. A DTO is crippled in the same way. Tables 6, 7 and 8 demonstrate the efficiency of the NC HIDTA in removing illicit drugs and drug profits from the DTOs. Based upon available funding, the NC HIDTA invested \$2,382,676 million to achieve these two goals. In both instances the NC HIDTA succeeded.

During 2005, the NC HIDTA permanently removed \$319,907,974 million in illicit drugs and \$9,721,604 million in drug profits from the marketplace, for a total of \$329,629,578. When examined in budget terms, these results yield an impressive overall rate of return (ROI) of \$138 for every \$1.00 of HIDTA funding invested in NC HIDTA law enforcement and intelligence initiatives.

Table 10 - Note: This chart tabulates dollar value of the seized lab based on one-time production amounts. Most of these labs would have been used multiple times. Thus the production that was interrupted by the seizure could be notable. Statistical estimates of repeat uses of a lab are not captured on this table.

The dollar value per ounce of methamphetamine is based on the price range provided by then 2005 NC HIDTA Threat Assessment Survey. In the Bay Area crystal is estimated value is \$550.00 per ounce.

Table 10 collects the number of seized methamphetamine production labs. Some initiatives seized crystal conversion labs, which are not included in the tables. Conversion labs process powdered methamphetamine into crystal.

Training is essential in improving the safety, efficiency and effectiveness of NC HIDTA operations. NC HIDTA training was designed to improve computer and analytical skills, bolster

investigative knowledge, and develop managerial abilities. This training was provided free of charge to NC HIDTA assigned and participating agency investigators as well as other law enforcement officers from throughout the region. These training courses would not have been available without NC HIDTA support and funding. Additionally, in 2005 the NC HIDTA and DEA sponsored its second annual Mobile FLEAT class to analysts and other law enforcement personnel. This was an 80-hour course. Students from the region and across the nation attended.

Separate law enforcement initiatives, while aggressively pursuing suspects or covering an event, can easily cross paths in the field. This can be dangerous if either party is unaware of the other. In a “best case” scenario, it merely results in harmless interference. At worst, however, it could cost an officer his or her life in a dangerous encounter. Information which can serve to deconflict such potential encounters is vital to well coordinated law enforcement investigative and tactical operations. The NC HIDTA provides such information through its contract with the Los Angeles Clearinghouse (LACLEAR). Of the fourteen (14) NC HIDTA initiatives eligible to use deconfliction services, all fourteen (14) took advantage of these valuable tools. Table 13 and 14 depict how well NC HIDTA initiatives and participating agencies used these services. Event and case/subject deconflictions increased compared to baseline data. These services promote officer safety, conserve resources and help to coordinate investigations. NC HIDTA funded deconfliction services are available to every law enforcement agency in the region. Regional training on the importance of deconflicting operations has been presented throughout the region by NC HIDTA and LA CLEAR staff. Based upon an NC HIDTA survey it is believed that most, if not all agencies conducting drug investigations in the region are using both the case and tactical deconfliction services made available through the HIDTA.

Table 15 – Note: The 2004 baseline data for this table was based on the definitions used in the first year of the PMP. NC HIDTA added the total number of initiative cases that received analytical support from any source. We understand that the 2005 data should only consider cases that were supported by NC HIDTA ISC analytical resources. Thus the numbers in the baseline are significantly higher than the totals for 2005. Additionally, the data for 2005 only includes the number of cases newly receiving analytical support from the ISC during the year, not the total number of cases receiving support from the ISC. Thirteen cases carried over from the previous year, and support of them continued into 2005. These carry-over cases included some of the major CPOT and OCDETF investigations, several of which are worked by multiple initiatives.

The NC HIDTA supports a variety of important projects in the Bay Area. These projects are in direct support of targeting our regional threat, according to our annual Threat Assessment and our PMP Matrix. The nature and importance of these projects is not explained by the Core Tables, but can be summarized as follows: The ISC provided full-time analytical support to a violent crime/gang initiative in San Mateo County, and to a marijuana organization targeting

effort based in San Francisco DEA. We provided part-time analytical support to SAR research in support of the efforts of the High Intensity Financial Crimes Area. We have also researched leads from a variety of law enforcement and civilian sources, and passed them to appropriate investigative entities.

Table 16 - Note: The PMP submitted in 2005, for data from 2004, asked for reporting on the number of referrals passed to other departments and agencies. We were unable to report that data last year, due to the requirement being issued after the year’s collection of data was concluded. This explains the lack of baseline data for 2004.

During 2005, we asked the initiatives to report on the number of Cases Referred to Other Offices, and the number of Leads Referred to Other Offices. We received some reporting of this activity. The PMP guidelines for 2005 data have rephrased the question to: “Cases Referred to Other HIDTAs” and “Cases Referred to Other Agencies.” Table 16 reflects the data we collected for “Cases Referred to Other Offices,” which have been placed in the most similar Table 16 box, “Cases Referred to Other Agencies.”

The referral totals we collected include referral activity by the ISC. Please note the investigative initiatives referral statistic is documented as part of Appendix G, “Initiative Statistics for CY 2005” total. The ISC (a support initiative) is documented in a separate log sheet. The two statistics are combined for the annual report. The investigative initiatives made four referrals of cases to other offices. The ISC made four referrals.

VII. Conclusions

The reporting period of January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2005 was the eighth year of operation for NC HIDTA. The NC HIDTA Program continues to increase its: involvement in high-level investigations, participation in deconfliction, use of the equipment lending pool, intelligence support to law enforcement and overall service to the community. The NC HIDTA Program seeks to develop and sharpen its services by developing state of the art web-based investigative/training databases and inventory controls.

State and local law enforcement departments throughout the region continue to experience funding cutbacks. As funding is lost, the ability of those agencies to work together in a cooperative manner to conduct drug investigations becomes even more critical than in past years. By being a neutral, "fair broker", the NC HIDTA assists in fostering cooperative relationships and the consolidation of resources, enabling agencies in the region to continue conducting meaningful and successful drug trafficking and manufacturing investigations.

NC HIDTA's ability to fund and support intelligence-led drug enforcement operations has been critical to drug enforcement operations in the greater San Francisco Bay Area. The NC HIDTA is the only source of region-wide, all-level (state, local, and federal) drug law enforcement information-sharing and intelligence. The NC HIDTA remains the primary provider of deconfliction services, analytical support, and investigative equipment loans. The NC HIDTA also served the regions law enforcement community as a significant provider of investigative and analytical training in the region.


Through these activities, the NC HIDTA has increased law enforcement capabilities in the region. The funding provided by ONDCP through the NC HIDTA program leverages law enforcement services and acts as a force multiplier for law enforcement agencies that are attempting, despite diminishing budgets, to have an impact on the illicit drug problem and drug related crime. The seizure data from task forces that receive HIDTA funding shows that there is an outstanding return on the investment of federal HIDTA dollars. Each HIDTA dollar (\$1.00) spent on Enforcement and Intelligence returned \$138.00 in seized drugs and proceeds (Core Table 8.)

CY 2005 marks the second year that the NC HIDTA has reported initiative operational targets and subsequent outcomes using the new Performance Management Process (PMP) providing efficiency and effectiveness performance measures results for each federal dollar spent. It was the first year of using the automated PMP database system. The PMP process was adopted as a key component allowing the NC HIDTA to focus on meaningful outcomes. As of CY 2004 this is one of the main principles that now guide how every NC HIDTA initiative approaches its effort to reduce drug crime. The preliminary data from the annual report and PMP process has already led the NC HIDTA's Executive Board to make strong recommendations to reduce the number of initiatives for FY 2006 and to restructure them to more effectively address the drug threat. More than 40 federal, state and local agencies in the NC HIDTA region participate in the NC HIDTA law enforcement and investigative support initiatives. Proactive thinking is the touchstone of NC HIDTA local support as staff strives to foster efficiency and effectiveness among and between the initiatives under its guidance, through interagency cooperation and information sharing.

Although the NC HIDTA has made considerable progress over the past year, there is still a great deal of work left to do. The emergence of internationally-connected drug trafficking organizations, the continuation of the methamphetamine manufacturing problem, the increase in domestically grown high potency marijuana and the emergence of pharmaceutical drugs being available via the internet fuels addiction, crime and gang violence throughout the region while adversely affecting the quality of life for the citizens of the San Francisco Bay Area. These drug related threats and those that will undoubtedly emerge during this coming year all pose a challenge to the NC HIDTA's limited resources and to the law enforcement agencies that participate in drug enforcement throughout the region. By bringing together a partnership of criminal justice professionals and developing innovative, effective solutions to the region's drug threats, the NC HIDTA will continue to lead the effort to protect regional residents from the scourge of illegal drugs.

F. NC HIDTA Initiatives Description

BAYNIN

Includes the Intelligence Group, the deconfliction services of LA CLEAR, Equipment Pool, and wire room.

Alameda County Violent Crime Gang Task Force

The Alameda Gang Task Force focuses on street gang organizations as its primary strategy. The initiative consists of two components:

Group 1: Oakland Violent Crime/Narcotics Group

The Oakland Violent Crime/Narcotics Group accomplishes its mission of pursuing, disrupting and dismantling narcotics dealers associated with violent crime organizations.

Group 2: Southern Alameda County Gang Violence Suppression Group

The Southern Alameda County Gang Violence Suppression Group accomplishes its mission by focusing on drug trafficking, illegal firearms use and other gang-related crime.

East Bay Heroin and Methamphetamine Task Force

Is managed by the CA/DOJ/BNE. The task force is based in Contra Costa County, focusing on methamphetamine and heroin distribution organizations, as well as reduction of drug-related crimes and violence.

Joint Money Laundering Initiative

Is a new initiative in 2005. It is managed by the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). This initiative targets drug organizations that launders money and other drug proceeds both internationally and domestically and identifies and monitors the methods used by drug organization and money launderers to transport drug proceeds into and out of the San Francisco Bay Area.

Marin County Drug Task Force

Is managed by the Marin County Sheriff's Department. This initiative targets methamphetamine and heroin drug trafficking organizations impacting Marin County and surrounding areas.

The Northern California Clandestine Laboratory Task Force

Is managed by the CA/DOJ/BNE. It was located in Richmond, California (Contra Costa County) but relocated to San Francisco, CA in early 2005. The task force targets rogue chemical suppliers, methamphetamine manufacturers, distributors, and financial assets of drug trafficking organizations.

The Oakland Area Violent Crime Drug Task Force

Is managed by the Drug Enforcement Administration. It targets networks of violent drug offenders in the Oakland area.

The San Francisco Violent Crime Drug Task Force

Is managed by the Drug Enforcement Administration. It targets networks of violent drug offenders in the San Francisco area.

San Mateo County Narcotic Task Force

Is sponsored by the San Mateo County Sheriff's Office. This task force addresses methamphetamine, heroin, and cocaine manufacturing and/or distribution organizations operating in (and beyond) the county.

Santa Cruz County Task Force is managed by the CA/DOJ/BNE

This initiative targets methamphetamine and heroin drug trafficking organizations operating in Santa Cruz and its surrounding counties

Sonoma County Methamphetamine Task Force

Is managed by the Drug Enforcement Administration. This task force targets methamphetamine and heroin drug trafficking organizations impacting Sonoma County and its surrounding areas.

South Bay Metro Task Force

Is a multi-agency task force managed by the San Jose, California, DOJ/BNE. They direct investigative efforts at methamphetamine production, importation and distribution organizations in the southern San Francisco Bay area. Many of their targets move between the South Bay and Central Valley areas of California.

Interdiction Initiatives:

The Bay Area Interdiction Team/Bay Area HIDTA Transportation Group (SFIA)

In 2005 the Club Drug Interdiction Initiative combined with the Bay Area HIDTA Transportation San Francisco International Airport Group and became the Bay Area Narcotic Interdiction Team Initiative. Based at the San Francisco Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement with an additional location at the San Francisco Airport, the goal of this initiative is to dismantle and disrupt the organizations responsible for transporting heroin, methamphetamine and precursor chemicals through transportation facilities. The groups work the: San Francisco Airport and the San Francisco Airport Mail Facility.

Bay Area HIDTA Transportation Group (Oakland)

Is managed by the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Group located in Oakland, CA. This initiative targets all international shipments of controlled substances into the NCHIDTA region, including Bay Area seaports.

San Francisco Campaign Against Drug Abuse (Discontinued)

Is managed by the CA/DOJ/BNE located in San Francisco County. The goal of this task force is to break the cycle of chronic heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine addiction and related criminal conduct. This is an enforcement initiative targeting the most chronic addict population and its sources of supply. This initiative was discontinued in 2005.
