## **Spokane, Washington**

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking, and enforcement statistics.

### **Demographics<sup>1</sup>**

- Population (2000 Census): 195,629
- Race/Ethnicity (2000 Census): 87.9% white; 2.0% black/African American; 1.6% American Indian/Alaska Native; 2.2% Asian; 0.2% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 0.1% other; 3.0% two or more races; and 3.0% Hispanic/Latino (any race)
- The city of Spokane is located in Spokane County.

### **Programs/Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>6</sup>  
Designated in 1997, the Northwest HIDTA is responsible for Benton, Clark, Cowlitz, Franklin, King, Kitsap, Lewis, Pierce, Skagit, Snohomish, Spokane, Thurston, Whatcom, and Yakima counties in Washington.
- Meth Action Team<sup>7</sup>  
Prosecutors, police, counselors, teachers and health officials have united to form a Meth Action Team to combat meth production, trafficking and use in Spokane. The Meth Action Team promotes legislative changes concerning ephedrine, a higher tax on the chemicals used to make meth, more neighborhood involvement, and more meth education in area schools.
- Drug-Free/Gun-Free Zones<sup>8</sup>  
The Drug-Free/Gun-Free Zones were established in Spokane in 1993 in compliance with State and Federal guidelines. One facet of the program is to educate schools, communities, and law enforcement on laws and penalties for violating the restriction around all schools and city parks. Additionally, the program involves the posting of uniform signs around the areas. When signs are posted, violators have notification of their proximity to school and park zones and the severity of crimes that take place there. It is believed that effective enforcement of the Drug-Free/Gun-Free Zones deters gang and school-related violence.
- Changing Our Lives Together (C.O.L.T.)<sup>9</sup>  
C.O.L.T. embraces issues of teen substance abuse, gang involvement and violence prevention, with a unique and positive approach. Volunteers, education, equine therapy and a family-like atmosphere involve children from 'at-risk' neighborhoods in a world beyond their streets.

**Federal Funding**

- Drug-Free Communities Support Program<sup>10</sup>  
 Since funding was first made available through the Drug-Free Communities Support Program in FY 1998, only one Spokane coalition has received funding. In FY 1999, the Greater Spokane Substance Abuse Council Prevention Center received \$99,847.
- Executive Office for Weed and Seed<sup>11</sup>  
 Spokane has received official recognition and Federal funding as a Weed and Seed site.
- Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) FY 2002 Discretionary Funds received in Spokane:<sup>12</sup>

- Spokane did not receive funding for the FY 2002 Office of Justice Programs Drug Court Grant Program.<sup>13</sup>
- FY 2002 Office of Community Oriented Policing Services Methamphetamine Grant amount received in Spokane:<sup>14</sup>
  - \$222,222 was awarded to the Spokane County Sheriff’s Department
- FY 2001 Housing and Urban Development Drug Elimination Grant amounts received in Spokane:<sup>15</sup>
  - \$124,287 to Mt. Vernon Terrace Apartments
- FY 2002 Office of Justice Programs and Community Oriented Policing Services grant amounts received by Spokane recipients:<sup>16</sup>

**Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- According to preliminary 2002 data, 46.1% of adult male arrestees in Spokane reported using marijuana within the past seven days.<sup>17</sup>

- During 2000, the crime index total for Spokane was 16,317.<sup>18</sup> This number increased to 17,073 during 2001.<sup>19</sup> According to preliminary data, the crime index total for Spokane during 2002 was 15,895.<sup>20</sup>

- During 1998, the Spokane Police Department reported 948 felony drug arrests. This number has since decreased to 811 during 2002.<sup>21</sup>

- From 1992 to 1997, the number of Spokane felony drug arrests involving methamphetamine increased from 3 to 367. Total felony drug arrests increased from 427 during 1992 to 828 during 1997.<sup>22</sup>

- The number of incidents reported by the Spokane Community Oriented Policing Substations unit for drug houses and drug activity increased from 367 in 1997 to 705 in 2001.<sup>23</sup>
- The Spokane Police Department reports an increase in the number of pharmacy and residential burglaries.<sup>24</sup>

### Drugs

- Cocaine  
Crack cocaine is readily available in Spokane and typically sells for \$20 per rock.<sup>25</sup>
- Heroin  
In FY 2002, heroin sold for \$180 per gram in Spokane.<sup>26</sup>
- Methamphetamine  
In Spokane during FY 2002, methamphetamine sold for \$4,000-\$9,000 per pound, \$550-\$750 per ounce, and \$40 per gram.<sup>27</sup>
- Club Drugs  
MDMA is readily available and abused by teens and young adults in Spokane.<sup>28</sup>

### Enforcement

- As of October 31, 2001, there were 401 full-time law enforcement employees in Spokane (293 officers and 108 civilians).<sup>29</sup>
- Special Investigative Unit (SIU)<sup>30</sup>  
The Spokane Police Department's SIU is responsible for investigating drug-related crime. In addition, drug recognition and eradication training are provided to all law enforcement. All felony drug cases generated from patrol officers are assigned to the SIU.

### Trafficking and Seizures

- MDMA is sometimes transported from Spokane to Alaska, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, and Utah.<sup>31</sup>
- A major drug trafficking ring was disbanded by the DEA and local law enforcement in October 2002. From 2000-2002, two major businesses were used as cover in order to traffic "volume quantities" of MDMA, cocaine, and marijuana.<sup>32</sup>

- In August 2002, a local task force seized 1,240 cases of pseudoephedrine, which produces approximately 300 pounds of pure methamphetamine.<sup>33</sup>
- During 2001, approximately 248 methamphetamine labs and dumpsites were reported in Spokane County.<sup>34</sup>
- In FY 2000, U.S. Border Patrol agents at the Spokane and Blaine sectors seized almost 5,000 pounds of marijuana, accounting for nearly 70% of all of the marijuana seized at the Border during the year.<sup>35</sup>

### Courts

- Drug Courts<sup>36</sup>  
As of May 2003, there were 2 drug courts in existence in Spokane. One of the drug courts has been operating for more than 2 years and the other was recently implemented.
- Spokane County has created a special court to handle a growing backlog of methamphetamine cases. On January 21, 2003, Spokane County court officials stated that there were 187 cases awaiting trial that involved serious felony charges of methamphetamine manufacturing or distribution. An estimated 1,000 other cases are pending in county courts that involve less serious methamphetamine possession offenses.<sup>37</sup>
- During FY 2001, approximately 31% (30.9%) of the Federally-sentenced defendants in eastern Washington had committed drug offenses. Forty-seven percent of the drug offenses (47 offenses) involved methamphetamine.<sup>38</sup>

### Consequences of Use

- During 2001, there were 22 methamphetamine-related events in Spokane County that were collected in the Hazardous Substances Emergency Events Surveillance database. There were 12 injuries associated with the methamphetamine-related events.<sup>39</sup>
- There were 54 drug-related deaths in Spokane County during 2001.<sup>40</sup>

**Treatment**

- According to preliminary 2002 data, 34.7% of adult male arrestees in Spokane indicated that they received outpatient drug treatment within their lifetime and 32.2% reported receiving inpatient drug treatment within their lifetime.<sup>41</sup>

- During FY 2001, there were 522 adult admissions to treatment in Spokane County with methamphetamine as the primary drug of abuse.<sup>42</sup>

- During FY 2001, there were 32 juvenile admissions to treatment in Spokane County with methamphetamine as the primary drug of abuse.<sup>43</sup>
